

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1.Introduction



1.1 Carthage, an UNESCO World Heritage Site in Tunisia

Carthage is an archaeological site of almost 500 hectars set on a hill overlooking the Gulf of Tunis and the surrounding plain. A metropolis of the Punic civilization in Africa and capital of the province of Africa in Roman times, Carthage played a central part in Antiquity as a great commercial empire.

Founded at the end of the 9th century B.C. by Elyssa Didon, Carthage is an exceptional place where several successive cultures (Phoenician-Punic, Roman, Paleo-Christian and Arab) intermingled, spread and flourished. This metropolis and its ports fostered large-scale trading in the Mediterranean.

The archaeological site of Carthage has been listed on the UNESCO World Heritage since 1979. The main known components of the site of Carthage are the Acropolis of Byrsa, the Punic ports, the Punic Tophet, the necropolises, the theatre, the amphitheater, the circus, the villa quarter, the basilicas, the Antonine baths, the Malaga cisterns and the archaeological reserve.

The competition concerns one of the sites of Carthage, the Acropolis of Byrsa, which includes archaeological remains,

outdoor spaces (UNESCO square, Esplanade, patio and gardens) and historic buildings (former cathedral, former seminary and Père Delattre room). Expertise France launched the Carthage international open competition on 6th of September 2022.





1.2. The goals of the project

The competition's main objectives of are as follows:

- To find the best enhancement and revitalization concept for this archaeological site listed as an UNESCO World Heritage.
- To find the best architectural, landscape and planning concept for this new place of cultural life.
- To find an innovative museography illustrating the history of one of the greatest metropolises in the ancient Mediterranean.
- To provide functional communication between a national museum, a scientific and research center, and recreational and cultural facilities.
- To find the best solutions for access to the site and manage the various flows around it.
- To set the project within a sustainable and inclusive development approach to response to the ecological, energy and environmental transitions challenges.



1.3. Evaluation criteria

The evaluation criteria are listed below. The order of the criteria listed does not reflect any priority:

- Pertinence of overall concept and ability to strengthen the site's "UNESCO World Heritage" identity
- Respect of environmental quality, natural comfort and energy efficiency
- Innovation, originality and creativity of the overall proposal
- Quality and appropriateness of architectural expression
- Quality of the outdoors spaces treatment
- Consistency of the functional organization with the expectations of the program
- Quality of the scenographic concept
- Feasibility and potential to implement the project regarding the technical and financial constraints







1.4 UIA Endorsement

This competition is organized with the approval of the OAT and endorsed by the International Union of Architects (UIA - http://www.uia-architectes.org.)

The UIA endorsement was given on the English version of the competition rules. The UIA shall not be held responsible for translation into other languages or differences with the original French version.



1.5 Legal framework

The competition was conducted in accordance with the General Principles of Public Procurement Law as derived from the European Directive 2014/24/EU, the UNESCO Standard Regulations for International Competitions in Architecture and Town Planning, and the UIA Best Practice Recommendations (See: https://www.uia-architectes.org/wpcontent/uploads/2022/02/2_UIA_competition_guide_2020.pdf)

The competition was implemented in accordance with the principles of equality, non-discrimination, mutual recognition, proportionality, transparency and confidentiality requirements.

1.6 Qualification requirements

This competition was open to architects from all countries having diplomatic relations with Tunisia, constituted in a grouping of architects and landscape designer (https://www.diplomatie.gov.tn/)

Eligible architects must be authorized for architectural practice in their respective country of residence or origin.

Nota bene: teams including a Tunisian architect (registered with the Order of Architects of Tunisia – OAT) in the project team are recommended.

If the winning project team does not have a Tunisian architect, it must partner with at least one Tunisian architect registered with the Order of Architects of Tunisia. A foreign winner can also choose to become member of the Tunisian Order of Architects. The Order has insured in this case an accelerated procedure.

2. Jury session



2.1 Jury Session

The jury session took place on March 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th in Carthage (Tunisia).

Visit of the site

On March 16th afternoon the jury visited the competition site and the surrounding archeological zone as well as points in Tunis from which the hill of Byrsa and its historical buildings are particularly visible. The visit took place under the guidance of the curator of the Carthage Museum. An informal meeting took place in the evening giving the opportunity to jury members to present themselves, to representatives of the organizer Expertise France to inform about the sponsors and the legal frame, and the UIA observer to explain the philosophy of UIA competitions conducted according to the UNESCO Regulations and UIA best practice recommendations and remind the responsibilities of the jurors.







Organization of the session

The entries were exposed in the halls of the eastern wing of the former seminary where the evaluation process took place. Being on the competition site facilitated verifications on the site at the discretion of jurors needs during the evaluation process.

Simultaneous translation French-English and English-French was provided during the whole session, so that jurors and technical advisors could choose the language they felt most comfortable to speak. The working language of the jury was English.

The jury session was conducted in presence of all jurors and alternates, the two technical advisors, the UIA observer and the translators.

Technical report

On March 17th the formal session was opened by the representatives of Expertise France who reported that:

- 94 entries were submitted electronically within the deadline.
- A bailiff was charged to anonymize the digital entries and the packages.
- In all cases digital and printed entries were identical.
- Some difficulties with the arrivals of packages in Tunis could be managed by Expertise France with the help of the bailiff. All entries were timely submitted and accepted for evaluation by the jury.

The two technical advisors presented the technical report and explained the results of the specialists' work. Specialists examined all entries from the point of view of their specialty and wrote a report for each project. On this basis, the technical advisors prepared a synthetic overview in order to give clear signals to the jury.



Evaluation process

The jury president explained the recommended UIA evaluation procedure. The jury examined all projects taking under consideration the evaluation criteria set in the brief. The evaluation of all projects was done in the presence and with the contribution of all jurors.

The evaluation process was conducted with successive evaluation rounds dismissing each time the less good projects in order to identify the short-listed projects which were analyzed and discussed thoroughly.





Orientation round

In an orientation round, the technical advisors introduced all projects and informed about special remarks noted in the technical report or the reports of the specialists. The jury took note of the report and remarks of the technical committee on each project.

In view of the complexity of the task and the number of projects derogating to diverse parameters of the competition brief, the jury decided to tolerate all derogations and not to exclude any derogating projects from the evaluation or from the attribution of prizes.







First evaluation round

The president formed **5 groups with 2 jurors** each and assigned them a tentatively equal number of projects for individual study. The group members became the reporters of the assigned projects for the following evaluation round.

All projects were discussed in presence of the whole jury in front of the panels. In the first round, **55 projects** were dismissed by consensus for one, more or all of following reasons:

- missing clarity or inadequacy of the overall concept
- unsatisfactory proposals in regard to principal evaluation criteria

At the end of the first day all jury members were given the opportunity to visit individually the exposed entries in order to make sure that no project was unjustly dismissed in the first round.

Second evaluation round

At the beginning of the session on the second day (March 18th) jurors did not propose any modifications concerning the results of the first evaluation round. The remaining **39** projects were assigned to **5 teams of 2 jurors** for individual study. The teams were composed by a combination of different jurors who were also assigned different projects than in the previous round.

The reporters presented the results of their analysis to the whole jury. The projects were discussed with the participation of all jurors in front of the panels. In the second evaluation round, **26 projects** were dismissed by consensus for unsatisfactory proposals in regard to one, more or all of following criteria:

- heritage and relation to existing buildings and landscape
- architecture and scenography concept
- functionality, economy, feasibility

Third evaluation round

Fourth evaluation round

At the beginning of the third jury session day (March 19th) the remaining 6 finalist projects were assigned to 5 teams of two jurors for thorough examination under consideration of all evaluation criteria and formulation of the written critics. Special focus was given to the merits of the projects in regard to following aspects:

- pertinence and adequacy of the overall concept
- potential to strengthen the identity as UNESCO World heritage site
- heritage and landscape approach
- relation to existing buildings and landscape
- quality of design and appropriateness of architectural expression
- quality and appropriateness of exhibition spaces
- functionality
- materialization
- economy
- feasibility



The critics were read in front of all jury members and amended. All jury members were asked to express their opinions on the projects.

Verification round

Before ranking the finalist projects, the jury undertook a verification round to make sure that no good project was unjustly dismissed in previous rounds. By majority vote the jury reclassified following two projects from the second to the third round. They will be documented in the jury report together with the projects of the round they achieved.

The jury invited the heritage specialist to discuss the finalist projects and clarified several aspects concerning the interpretation of heritage constraints. After reading loud the reports the authors of the shortlisted projects had submitted, the jury verified several declarations of the authors and discussed the qualities of the short-listed projects.

2.2. Ranking and prizes

The jury ranked the 5 finalist projects by majority vote on each position separately and allocated the 5 prizes.

The critics drafted in the morning were reviewed after verification of declarations the authors made in their reports and include remarks made by the specialists in their reports. The content of the critics was approved in principle by the jury. For a better readability the critics are included with the documentation of the projects.

The jury report on the conduct of the session and the ranking list was signed by the jury. At the end of the jury session the jury formulated general remarks and recommendations.

The total prize money available was EUR 200 000.

Five prizes were, as announced in the brief, attributed by the jury.

The prize money will be paid in 30 days after the final results of the Competition are announced.

Any possible taxes or charges on prize money the winners might be obliged to pay in his/her country shall be his/her responsibility and will not be compensated by the Contracting Authority.

2.3 General remarks and recommendations of the jury

- focused their designs on buildings and did not include landscape and archeological promenade proposals
- -did not respect heritage constraints
- exceeded the programmatic surfaces and therefore also the budget frame

Further the jury noted that:

- -the site is very sensitive with multiple layers of different historical periods requesting rather minimal but strategic interventions for the museum
- -the existing buildings do not provide ideal spaces for exhibitions unless with important transformation efforts

- the potential of the site cannot be sufficiently exploited within the given budget frame

Therefore, the jury recommends:

- -a larger interpretation of heritage constraints
- if possible, a separate credit for exterior and landscaping interventions.

The first prize winner project clarifies and orders the site and is an outstanding and original design in terms of artistic expression. It has the potential to give an identity to the UNESCO World heritage site and will become a sensitive landmark connecting the existing monuments.

The Jury recommends the Client to mandate the first prizewinner and develop the project further in order to realize the incredible potential of the Architectural Concept proposed.


The jury president opened the envelopes of the shortlisted projects and revealed their identity to the jurors. Expertise France was charged to open the rest of the envelopes.





Jury's appreciation

The project places value on the existing, reinforces the importance of the cathedral and the seminary identifying them as the main elements and clarifies the composition by removing all the secondary buildings of the ensemble that were added in previous interventions. The Project proposes the new building in between them, occupying the former courtyard. By doing this, the proposal generates an ensemble of different architectures establishing a subtle dialogue between them and achieves a right balance within the context. The clarity and the simplicity of this concept allows to the site to open up towards all the orientations, finding a right relation between landscape and architecture, between old and new, and recognizing these facts as fundamental aspects of the intervention.

The intervention is the expression of a relaxed and natural way of experiencing the site. The landscape approach does not only organize the main access from the UNESCO square controlling its scale, but establishes also a strong relationship between the exterior and the interior experience.

The new building extends the idea of landscape by composing a new roof characterized by its structural system. this structure can be a very superficial foundation systems which will be harmless to the nature of the protected soil, gives also more importance and relevance in terms of scale to the protected

structures of the Cathedral and the seminary. Architecture as landscape is a concept that has the capacity of providing a unique and memorable space complementing the existing.

The project relates the exhibition spaces directly with the exterior, suggesting a strategy of maximum flexibility that can evolve in time. By not committing with a fix concept the project generates a space that will help curators to adapt the museum to future needs.

The project reuses the existing buildings in a very convincing way; the former cathedral hosts as its main use, the auditorium. The former seminary, hosts the service spaces and the areas of daily activity, that correspond to the original typology of the building. The new building, situated in between the pre-existing mainly organizes the entrance and the exhibition spaces; enabling direct contact with the exterior. The way the project solves this space allows flexibility and adaptability to different strategies that can be modified according to the way the museum and its needs evolve. The proposed museum concept is future-oriented and particularly appropriate to expose archeological findings. Structure and light are the elements that define the main spaces of the project. They give a strong atmosphere and a strong identity to the building and an appropriate typology for an archeological museum.

This outstanding proposal focuses on what is essential and uses repetition as the fundamental strategy to generate a space that can be perceived in many different manners; complex and simple, sophisticated and essential; all at the same time.

The project is a good proposal in regard to economy and feasibility. The proposed construction enables a controlled impact on the site during its construction. The project solves the challenge of extending the existing with a subtle roof; an element able to establish a dialogue with the cathedral and the seminary, but also strengthen the identity of the place. The project has the capacity of becoming an expressive but discrete landmark, appearing as a timeless architecture able to establish a link between the sites and the times past present and future.

Recommendations

In its further development the project needs to elaborate intelligent technical solutions for drainage, waterproofing and treatment of rainwater evacuation. The foundation concept should avoid damaging the potential archeological discoveries in the former courtyard. An eventual reduction of the coverage area by the proposed structure and a bigger patio/courtyard towards the cathedral should be examined. Particular care of the building materialization must be taken into consideration to ensure its durability, maintenance and climate challenges.



The concept and the architectural quality developed in this project denote a wisdom characterized by a certain restraint to dialogue with the existing buildings. With one continues design element, the horizontal line, the project aims to hold together the different architectures of the site.

The location of the temporary exhibition and the storerooms are appropriate, but the layout needs to be reviewed. The access to the storerooms is interesting but the security issue needs to be studied. The exhibition devices are not ergonomic and present problems of perception however the lighting proposal is valuable.

This project enhances and expands the patio while accentuating its vegetation with a new modern landscape approach. The green patio incorporates an archaeological statuary collection that extends the museum visit outdoors.

The project preserves and enhances the citrus orchard garden in front of the administrative offices and laboratories.

A particular merit of the project is that it proposes an archeological promenade on the south side at the level of the excavated ruins on the hill and on the east side at the level of the Beulé apses. On this side, the footbridge allows to find a better understanding of the site and appreciate the view on the East facade of the seminary thus indicating the ancient decumanus maximus of the Roman period.

Overall, the project is a relevant and adequate proposal in relation to the archaeological and architectural constraints of the site. It is a project that, despite its strong and unifying expression through the line, remains humble in relation to the different elements structuring the site.

The innovation of the project consists in the creation of a new place of discovery of the site through a walk at different levels that offer new points of view for a better contemplation of the site. Another innovative proposal is the exhibition in a covered but transparent space of a part of the reserve of archaeological pieces. The overall intervention is appropriate and discrete. The line as unifying element in a context of existing buildings with different architectural expressions may however not be strong enough to hold the composition together and reinforce the identity of the site as UNESCO world heritage. The particular quality of the project is the promenade. The various footbridges and walks through the archeological zone as well as the main walkway at the level of the patio allow not only to rediscover the site but also to protect it.

The project offers a clear composition linked to the two main historical axes of the site. 

The proposal is characterized by a clear decision to separate the Museum and Archeology from the City and the Museum from the Archeological Landscape and to reinforce the courtyard space. This gives the scheme an institutional position. The question however is whether a museum of the future should be closed, or open to the surrounding archeological zone, which is the biggest patrimony of the site. The promenade of the exhibition is formal and ordered by the buildings structural grid, framed entrances and views between interior and exterior. It offers a sequence of special opportunities, like double height volumes, transparency, closed spaces, finishing the experience of the visitor with a dock floating over the archeological site that is excavated and in which ruins and vestiges of the past are evident.

The scenography concept is ordered by the structural frame which could sometimes constrain its layout and limit flexibility in the future. The proposed platforms and white bases are felt to be invasive.

The UNESCO Square and Courtyard provides a loose composition of plantations and paved surfaces, offering to visitors a relaxed, but not always defined layout, that contrasts with the formal grid of the building. The design of the Square does not refer to the archeological and historical context.

One of the biggest merits of this project is the choice of the material and the portico element, that allows natural cross ventilation, natural light and efficient thermal conditions without the use of mechanical systems.

Because of the nature of this structure, the deep foundations are likely to be destructive to eventual archeological remains. In addition, the demolition of one part of the Seminary building is in conflict with the building's protection status within a World Heritage site.

The project uses and restructures the existing buildings but also proposes additional new surfaces exceeding significantly the brief requirements. Therefore, significant modifications would be requested in order to meet the budget assigned to the project.

Despite its traditional form, the building allows a permeable layout with a good contact between its interior, exterior the cathedral and the archeological surroundings on the hill. It proposes the introduction of thermal bricks in an innovative way in order to reduce its carbon footprint; a crafted technique that could allow for partnering with local factories and promoting the materials development in Tunisia.

The proposal is a calm and timeless addition to a complex and multi-layered site, allowing its key features to blend with the materiality of the archeological vestiges of the site.

The project is characterized by a « colonnade » gallery that aims to bring unity to a fragmented site while retaining a human scale. It is defined by the motif of a modest concrete frame with cladding stone, that opens or closes depending on the program that it houses.



This allows for a unity and coherent treatment of all new buildings. The project mixes re-use of existing buildings and new structures. The building is two stories high, attempting to maintain a human scale, relatively close to the ground.

The new constructions' minimal height allows the existing buildings to stand out, specifically the Cathedral that it frames. However, the project impacts the existing building des Pères Blancs by extending its concrete frame over the façades, and snaking around the ground floor of the facades around the courtyard.

The division of the Place de UNESCO in 5 sequences shows a desire to create a more human scale for the public space. The topography created on the UNESCO square fits elegantly with the created volumes, allowing the buildings to appear as if they're emerging from the ground gently.

The scenography allows a fluid and continuous visit that follows a chronological order, framed by natural light. Four stairs are positioned at the corners of the building, in reference to the distribution of stairs in the Cathedral and giving access to the roof. Their position creates difficult access to the panoramic views at the level of the exhibition spaces, while opening them up on the roof. Exterior spaces use the Cardus Decumanus grid to create a unifying texture on the ground that resonates with the architectural project.

This concept could be improved by better incorporating the existing ground textures. The project respects the demands of the program, while making a new proposal for a "Carthage Library" inside the Cathedral, giving a use to this heritage site and opening it up to the public, nationally and internationally. The program is clearly distributed between public functions and services, technical and administrative functions.

The project occupies the site with an extended surface of the new buildings, what from environmental point of view is questionable.

The excessive footprint of this proposal makes it difficult to fit in the economy of this project.

The structural and constructive principles of the project are realistic. However, the project's spread over the site and heavy restructuring of the existing buildings, compromising the archaeological nature of soil as well as implicating a cost-heavy construction.

The desire to create unity through a low height and discreet intervention is pertinent for this site. The creation of the Carthage Library is an innovative approach to the program that deserves attention. A more mixed-use approach to the Cathedral could help condense the program and reduce its footprint which compromises the archaeological integrity of the site.




